## Mission and Goals

he W.E.B. Du Bois Center at the University of Massachusetts Amherst was established in 2009 to engage the nation and the world in discussion and scholarship about the global issues of race, labor, and social justice. The Center presents an interdisciplinary approach to the intersections among African American culture and history, social justice, and labor relations, opening this research to new insights and evaluation in light of issues confronting the world today.

By making its resources readily available to the public, the Center holds fast to the scholarly tradition and spirit of its namesake, W.E.B. Du Bois, a Massachusetts native son, who was pivotal to the social and political debates on race, class, and culture of the 20th century.

The Center is developing multi-media and online presentations to make the writings of W.E.B. Du Bois and his contemporaries accessible for their analysis and application to the problems and issues of the 21st century.







W.E.B. Du Bois

Born on February 23, 1868, a descendant of freed slaves, Du Bois was a pioneering civil rights leader, visionary, intellectual, sociologist, historian, novelist, and playwright. He was the first African American to be awarded a doctorate from Harvard University and he helped to found the Niagara Movement, the NAACP, and several Pan African Congresses. He died in Ghana on August 27, 1963, on the eve the historic civil rights march on Washington, DC.
